Artwork and Accomplishments

I am an emerging female artist whose work questions ideas of control, vulnerability and expectation with a focus on abstracted portraits. My discipline of choice is printmaking and I utilize techniques spanning the genre from traditional etching and silkscreen to experimental lithography, monotype and digital methods. My process is intimately tied to print-media's ability to combine photographic and hand-drawn elements in compelling ways, blurring realistic details with interpretive figure drawing. Part of a new era of feminism, my work doesn't pit itself against masculinity, but rather, intentionally considers a female experience in today's society.

My early training was in theater arts, studying Stanislovski Method acting as well as the Margolis-Brown method of movement theater. It was through this physically and emotionally rigorous training that I solidified my fascination with the human condition, what people do and why they do it. I became fascinated by the physical attributes of emotion and how subtle shifts of intention cause dramatically different effects. It was also in this environment that I developed an ethic of experimentation that has translated to my visual arts practice, particularly with utilizing print media's ability to create multiple iterations of a single image.

I exhibit my work regionally and nationally, often in collaboration with other print artists. I have professional memberships with the Southern Graphics Council and the Mid America Print Council, and my work has been featured in printed material by both. I was also selected to curate a portfolio of prints displayed during the Mid America Print Council 2012 conference in Cape Girardeau, MO. My work has appeared on Printeresting, the premier online blog for North American print arts, and has been featured numerous times during 2012 on the local arts/culture online magazine l'étoile. In summer 2012 I held my first solo show at Gamut gallery in downtown Minneapolis. During the exhibition I collaborated with award winning choreographer Judith Howard for an event held in the gallery space during the Fringe Festival.

Goals

Over the last few years I have developed an easily recognizable aesthetic. Because of this I have been able to create relationships with a handful of local galleries, curators, and artists. With a firm foundation set, it is time to raise the visibility by reaching both a larger audience and exhibition in more critically recognized venues. To do this I need to create new work that pushes my current content to the next level by working in a larger scale (a challenge in photographic/print media) and working with models other than myself. This large scale work will be created with the intention of being exhibited in a professional gallery setting. I will also connect with new audiences through work geared more towards street/music culture by the creation of limited edition apparel and smaller prints for a solo exhibition to be held in the gallery space at the Familia Skateshop in Uptown, Minneapolis on November 30th.

Barriers and Opportunities

Up until now I have relied primarily upon myself as a model in my work. While I have been able to maximize the use of my point and shoot camera through manipulation in Photoshop, my photographic equipment does limit the potential size and complexity of my projects. Additionally, since my work begins with digital photographs, working large scale requires a digital camera capable of taking high quality photos that can be manipulated for oversized output. It is also important to me that my work not be identified by self portraits. As the majority of my portraits are abstracted this has in the past not been an issue, but now that my work has a following, viewers are beginning to recognize my body in print. It is crucial for my success to build professional relationships with new models, particularly those with a background in movement arts.

The Project*

The Project

Purchasing professional photography equipment to be used to: 1) Create high quality digital photographs of models for the creation of a new body of work that will be exhibited in an upcoming solo show titled Balance at Familia Skateshop in Uptown, Minneapolis on November 30th, 2013. 2) Create and document large-scale installation work to be shown in the experimental performance space below Gamut Gallery (1001 Marquette, Minneapolis) in late August. The documentation will be used for gallery submissions and my website.

I have recently collaborated with two female performers from the local aerial circus performance studio Zyra. I was able to borrow a friends camera with the ability to shoot .raw high quality photos and the results were inspiring and affirmed to me that my next step requires the use of professional photography equipment. This amazing opportunity has opened a doorway for future collaboration that will benefit both myself and the Zyra studio by bridging our audiences and creating work that is in dialogue with one another. The girls have agreed to let me photograph them in the nude doing aerial work for a series of large scale prints. The series will capture a movement and translate it to 5 frames, for example, the girls twisting into into a balance position. I will then create 5 screenprints from this movement on transparent rice paper 27 x 56 inches that will be hung from the ceiling approximately 5 feet apart from each other. As the viewer moves through space they will also be moving forward in time, like a giant flip book. Zyra studio has agreed to a one night performance in conjunction with these prints being displayed in the experimental performance space below Gamut gallery. I will continue to experiment with translated movements and create a series of limited apparel and posters for a gallery show at Familia skateshop at the end of Nov- Dec 23rd. This show also coincides with the busy holiday shopping season and thus will result in a wide range of new potential viewers coming through the gallery. To successfully create and document the range of work for these two opportunities and to push the content/quality of my aesthetic my next step is to purchase and learn to use professional photographic equipment and lighting.

Timeline

July-August 2013 -Purchase equipment, collaborate with members of Zyra in several photoshoots, create a series of prints to be displayed in the experimental performance place below Gamut Gallery in Downtown Minneapolis.

September- Nov 15th, 2013 -Based on feedback from the project develop ideas for a series of smaller prints and apparel. Update website with new work regularly in preparation for Balance, a solo gallery show at Familia Skateshop. Create a dialogue through promotional materials with the Zyra audience.

Nov 16th-30th 2013 -Finalize and install work for Balance.

January, 2014- Submit final report for MRAC.

Outcomes

A cohesive new body of work that utilizes large scale printmaking processes and new models while expanding my audience and working in collaboration with local movement arts professionals.
